



Your animal finds food and shares it with its family. The moment shows care, teamwork, and full bellies.	Clouds roll in and rain begins to pound. Seasons change and the path stretches ahead. Your animal keeps moving, guided by memory, stars, or smell.	Dawn is soft and the world is still. 





Exposition (Beginning):

Introduce your setting and characters

2

Rising Action:

Show what your character is doing and build up to the problem.

3

Climax:

Show the BIG problem or exciting event.

4

Falling Action:

Show how the character tries to solve the problem and what happens next.

5

Ending:


Show how everything finishes and how the character feels.



Path A: Story Summary — 4-6 sentences



1) Who + where (Exposition)



2) Want + problem (Rising Action)



3) BIG moment (Climax)



4) What they try / what happens next (Falling Action)



5) How it ends + feeling (Ending)



Example Story Summary 1

Water Search

Heat grows and tongues are dry. Your animal follows tracks and shadows to find a cool, clean drink.



1) The sun was hot, and I walked with my elephant herd.



2) We wanted to find water, but every pond was dry.



3) Grandma elephant lifted her trunk and smelled the rain.



4) We followed her and found a big muddy water hole.



5) I splashed and played, feeling cool and happy again.



Example Story Summary 2

Long Journey

Seasons change and the path stretches ahead. Your animal keeps moving, guided by memory, stars, or smell.



1) I live in the cold snow with my penguin family.



2) I wanted to bring food home, but the ice went on forever.



3) A snowstorm came, and I couldn't see my way.



4) I listened for my family's calls and slid toward the sound.



5) I found them again and felt warm inside, even in the snow.



Path B: Full Draft - About 500 words

- Around 500 words total do as much or as little as you can!
- Short sentences
- Use this order:

Beginning \rightarrow Build-up \rightarrow BIG moment \rightarrow Fixing it \rightarrow Ending + feeling















Draft guide

- Beginning 2–3 lines
- Build-up 3–5 lines
- BIG moment 2-3 lines
- Fixing it 3–4 lines
- Ending + feeling 2-3 lines

Show, don't tell

Tell \rightarrow The cave was scary.

Show → My flashlight flickered on wet stone.

Tell \rightarrow The volcano was hot.

Show → Lava hissed under my boots.

What is an image prompt? →



What is a good image prompt?

What's a prompt?

It's the sentence that tells the app what to draw on this page.

Your main character stays the same—you change the action, place, and details.

The 4 Magic Parts (A-P-O-M)

- Action what is the character doing?
- Place where is it happening?
- Objects 1–2 things to include (props).
- Mood/Time how it feels (cozy, windy) or when (evening, rainy).



Quick Example Image Prompts

Good Prompt

"The explorer climbs a rocky mountain at sunrise; snow swirls, and an eagle circles

high above."

Not Good Prompt

"The character on a mountain."

Why is this not a good prompt? Put your hand up

Remember The 4 Magic Parts (A-P-O-M)

Action + Place + Objects + Mood/Time



Why is this a bad prompt?

Not Good Prompt

"The character on a mountain."

- Action No Action
- Place "Mountain"
- Cobjects No Objects
- Mood/Time No Mood/Time

The bad prompt has not passed

the 4 magic parts!





Why is this a good prompt?

Good Prompt

"The explorer climbs a rocky mountain at sunrise; snow swirls, and an eagle circles

high above."

- Action "Climbs a..."
- Place "Rocky mountain"
- Objects "Snow," "Eagle"
- Mood/Time "Sunrise"

The good prompt has passed

the 4 magic parts!




G2-5 What is Al? Optional Add On




The first question is...

What is A.I?










What is A.I?


Al = Artificial Intelligence.

- It means computers learn patterns from lots of examples.
- Then they use those patterns to help us: recognize voices, suggest words, translate,

draw pictures from words, and chat.







That's how your character was made!



In Build My Story, Al can:

- grow your summary into a story (Help me write)
- make pictures from your prompt (Create new image)

Remember!

Al is NOT a person. It has no feelings and can make mistakes.

YOU are the author — check, edit, and choose what to keep.

Story Summary → Big Story

Image Prompt →



Be smart & kind online:

- Don't share private info (full name, address, passwords).
- Ask an adult if something doesn't look right.
