



The Missing Pie	A Day as a Pilgrim	A Thankful Moment
On Thanksgiving, your family's favorite pie is gone! Write the story of how you find out what happened.	Pretend you are a child living a long time ago with the Pilgrims. Tell the story of your Thanksgiving day.	Tell a story about a time you felt very thankful. Who was there? What happened?
<u>If I Were a Turkey</u>	The Kids' Table	A Surprise Guest
Imagine you are a turkey. What happens when you try to escape Thanksgiving dinner?	Would you rather sit at the kids' table or the adults' table? Tell the story of what happens.	Imagine someone unexpected shows up at Thanksgiving dinner. Who is it, and what happens?
The Cooking Problem	Talking Cranberries	A New Tradition
The oven breaks right before dinner. Tell the story of how your family makes Thanksgiving work.	Imagine the cranberry sauce starts talking! What does it say, and what happens next?	Pretend your family tries something new for Thanksgiving this year. What is it, and how does it turn out?
The Parade Balloon You are at a Thanksgiving parade when a giant balloon gets loose. Tell the story of what happens.	The Time Machine You find a time machine on Thanksgiving Day. Where do you go, and what do you see?	The Magic Wishbone You win the wishbone pull, and your wish comes true. Tell the story of what happens next.
Dinner in the Woods	The Turkey Mystery	The Thankful Adventure
Pretend your family has to eat Thanksgiving in the forest. How do you make it work?	You are a detective, and the Thanksgiving turkey is missing. Tell the story of how you solve the case.	Imagine you collect "thankfulness" in a jar. What happens when you use it?



Make your idea small and specific

- One moment, not the whole day
- One place, not lots of locations
 - One problem to focus on
- If your idea is too big, zoom in!




Story Mountain overview

Climax:

Show the BIG problem or exciting event.



Rising Action:

Show what your characters are doing and build up to the problem.

Exposition (Beginning):

Introduce your setting and characters

Falling Action:

Show how the characters try to solve the problem and what happens next.

Ending:

Show how everything finishes and how the characters feel.



Turn to the person next to you and ask...

What is the BIG moment?

How do things finish and how do they feel at the end?






Build your main character

The 5-part story frame

1

Exposition (Beginning):

Introduce your setting and characters

2

Rising Action:

Show what your character is doing and build up to the problem.

3

Climax:

Show the BIG problem or exciting event.

4

Falling Action:

Show how the character tries to solve the problem and what happens next.

5

Ending:


Show how everything finishes and how the character feels.



Path A: Story Summary — 4-6 sentences



1) Who + where (Exposition)



2) Want + problem (Rising Action)



3) BIG moment (Climax)



4) What they try / what happens next (Falling Action)



5) How it ends + feeling (Ending)



Example Story Summary 1

A Thankful Moment

Tell a story about a time you felt very thankful. Who was there? What happened?



1) On Thanksgiving at Grandma Rosa's house, I was with my parents and little brother.



2) We wanted a cozy dinner, but a storm cut the power and the turkey was raw.



3) The big moment came when our neighbor, Mrs. Lee, arrived with hot rice and a lantern.



4) We grilled the turkey outside, shared food, and told stories by the glow.



5) Dinner worked after all, and I felt thankful for our neighbors and my family.



A Thankful Moment

Tell a story about a time you felt very thankful. Who was there? What happened?

Example Story Summary 2



1) On Thanksgiving morning at the community center, my class packed food boxes.



2) I wanted to help everyone, but we ran out of cans and families were still waiting.



3) The big moment came when my grandpa arrived with extra bags from our neighbors.



4) We filled every box, added kind notes, and carried them to the cars.



5) People smiled and said thank you, and I felt proud and thankful for Grandpa and our town.



Path B: Full Draft - About 500 words

- Around 500 words total do as much or as little as you can!
- Short sentences
- Use this order:

Beginning \rightarrow Build-up \rightarrow BIG moment \rightarrow Fixing it \rightarrow Ending + feeling















Draft guide

- Beginning 2–3 lines
- Build-up 3–5 lines
- BIG moment 2-3 lines
- Fixing it 3–4 lines
- Ending + feeling 2-3 lines

Show, don't tell

Tell \rightarrow I was happy.

Show \rightarrow I grinned and bounced in my chair.

Tell \rightarrow It smelled good.

Show \rightarrow Butter popped and cinnamon filled the kitchen.

What is an image prompt? →



What is a good image prompt?

What's a prompt?

It's the sentence that tells the app what to draw on this page.

Your main character stays the same—you change the action, place, and details.

The 4 Magic Parts (A-P-O-M)

- Action what is the character doing?
- Place where is it happening?
- Objects 1–2 things to include (props).
- Mood/Time how it feels (cozy, windy) or when (evening, rainy).



Quick Example Image Prompts

Good Prompt

"The character stirs a big pot in Grandma's kitchen at sunset; steam rises and a

pumpkin pie cools on the counter."

Not Good Prompt

"The character in the kitchen."

Why is this not a good prompt? Put your hand up

Remember The 4 Magic Parts (A-P-O-M)

Action + Place + Objects + Mood/Time



Why is this a bad prompt?

Not Good Prompt

"The character in the kitchen."

- Action No Action
- Place "The kitchen"
- Cobjects No Objects
- Mood/Time No Mood/Time

The bad prompt has not passed

the 4 magic parts!





Why is this a good prompt?

Good Prompt

"The character stirs a big pot in Grandma's kitchen at sunset; steam rises and a pumpkin pie cools on the counter."

- Action "Stirs a..."
- Place "Grandma's kitchen"
- Objects "Big Pot", "Pumpkin Pie"
- Mood/Time "Sunset"

The good prompt has passed

the 4 magic parts!




G2-6 What is Al? Optional Add On




The first question is...

What is A.I?










What is A.I?


Al = Artificial Intelligence.

- It means computers learn patterns from lots of examples.
- Then they use those patterns to help us: recognize voices, suggest words, translate,

draw pictures from words, and chat.







That's how your character was made!



In Build My Story, Al can:

- grow your summary into a story (Help me write)
- make pictures from your prompt (Create new image)

Remember!

Al is NOT a person. It has no feelings and can make mistakes.

YOU are the author — check, edit, and choose what to keep.

Story Summary → Big Story

Image Prompt →



Be smart & kind online:

- Don't share private info (full name, address, passwords).
- Ask an adult if something doesn't look right.
